




410: Fall of Rome


476: Collapse of the Roman Empire

The City of God (413-426)

- Author: Augustine of Hippo
 - Perhaps the greatest theologian in history – pioneering intellectual giant
 - Claimed by Catholics and Protestants
 - Founder of the Augustinian order (friars)
- 22 books/chapters, over 1,000 pages
- Summary: A defense of Christianity against pagan accusations and a vision of God's eternal kingdom versus earthly kingdoms.
- Quote: "Two cities have been formed by two loves: the earthly by the love of self, the heavenly by the love of God."



Structure of The City of God

- Books 1-10: Christian defense against pagan accusations
 - 1-5: Critique of pagan religion
 - 6-10: Critique of pagan philosophy
- Books 11-14: Origins of the City of God and City of Man
- Books 15-18: Histories of the City of God and City of Man
- Books 19-22: Destinies of the City of God and City of Man



The Fall of Rome (410 AD) and The City of God

- The Crisis:
 - Visigoths sack Rome
 - The empire is crumbling
 - Pagans blame Christianity
 - "The gods are angry"
- Augustine's Response
 - Christianity didn't weaken Rome
 - Rome fell due to moral decay
 - God's purposes transcend earthly kingdoms



The Two Cities Framework

Earthly City

- Citizens love self above God
- Seeks temporal peace
- Governed by human will
- At home in this world

City of God

- Citizens love God above self
- Seeks eternal peace
- Governed by divine will
- Pilgrims in this world

Book 5: God's Providence in History

Earthly City

- Success due to fate, luck, or power
- Rome's rise attributed to ambition and military might.
- Earthly glory is fleeting

City of God

- God's providence rules over all events
- Empires rise and fall by God's plan.
- Christians live as citizens of both cities.

"The true God, the giver of kingdoms, grants earthly rule to whom He wills."

Book 19: The Nature of Peace

Earthly City

- Seeks peace through domination and selflove.
- Peace is temporary, fragile, political.
- Defines happiness by earthly goods.
- Even war is waged for the

City of God

- Seek's eternal peace through God's love.
- True peace is the tranquility of order.
- Happiness found only in eternal life with God.
- Christians live as citizens of both cities.

"Peace is the calm that comes from order. The City of Man seeks it in vain; the City of God finds it in God alone."

Relevance to Modern America

- Dual citizenship: Living in Two Cities
- Understanding history through God's providence
- Redefining peace and security
- Correcting misplaced hopes
- Equipping the church to engage culture



How Now Shall We Live (1999)

- Author: Chuck Colson
 - American attorney, political figure (Nixon's "hatchet man")
 - Dramatic prison conversion, founder of Prison Fellowship
- **Summary:** A challenge to Christians to adopt a comprehensive biblical worldview, arguing that faith must shape every aspect of life—from politics to culture to personal ethics—in contrast to the secularism of modern society.
- **Quote:** "The church's singular failure in recent decades has been the failure to see Christianity as a life system, or worldview, that governs every area of existence."

Worldview Thinking

- Lens through which we see reality
- Answers life's basic questions
- Shapes values and decisions
- Often unconscious assumptions



Three-part Framework for Christian Worldview

Creation

- establishes that God made everything with purpose and design. This means objective truth exists, human life has inherent dignity, and there are moral absolutes.
- Against postmodern relativism, Colson argued that reality isn't socially constructed—it's Godconstructed.

The Fall


- explains why everything is broken. Sin affects not just individuals but institutions, cultures, and ways of thinking.
- This means Christians should expect resistance when they challenge secular assumptions. It also means we should approach cultural problems with both realism about human nature and hope for redemption.

Redemption

- is God's work of restoring all things through Christ. This isn't just individual salvation—it's cosmic restoration.
- Christians are called to participate in this work by bringing biblical principles into every sphere of life.

Chuck Colson's Worldview Grid (Based on How Now Shall We Live?)

Question	Christian Worldview	Secular/Naturalist Worldview
Where did we come from?	Created by God in His image	Random chance, natural processes
What went wrong?	Human sin and rebellion against God	Ignorance, environment, social structures
What is the solution?	Redemption through Christ, restoration	Education, technology, government reform
What is our purpose?	To glorify God and enjoy Him forever	Self-fulfillment, survival, progress



Cultural Engagement Strategy

- Understand secular worldviews
- Expose their contradictions
- Present Christian alternative
- Live out biblical principles
- Transform institutions from within

Augustine



- Church as institution




- Post-Christian culture
